One could be forgiven for harboring skepticism that one person – or one small act - can relieve the burden carried by 20% of our community who cannot afford basic necessities. Yet we know this to be true. At Neighbor to Neighbor we witness daily your generosity blossom beyond a simple donation.

When you donate vegetables grown from your garden, you give a mother the gift of a healthy child. When you donate a prom dress or tuxedo, you give the gift of giddiness for an evening without stress or worry. When you donate to an online coat or toy drive, you give the gift of a happy childhood. Many small gestures add up to **big** impact!

IN 2017-2018, YOUR SUPPORT ...

Created a healthier community:

- 2,140 people received enough nutritious food to prepare 360,000 meals
- \$698,000 worth of food was collected through over 100 food drives
- 9 contributors to our Impact Vine project raised \$1200 to supply 30 local children with brand new coats from L.L.Bean
- One anonymous donor funded the purchase of new blankets for over 1,000 families
- 25 clients enjoyed Thanksgiving dinner as guests of Christ Church and another 25 enjoyed Mother's Day brunch as guests of Harvest Time Church
- 300 students received 26,000 summer breakfasts and lunches in 2018 and 10,000 summer lunches in 2017
- Scores of gardeners, farmers and backyard growers contributed over 900 pounds of fresh fruits and vegetables during the growing season
- Distributed 20,000 diapers to keep babies healthy and clean
- Co-sponsored health screenings for 80 clients with Family Center's Health Clinic

Created economic security:

- 500 students in 2018 received new backpacks and school supplies for the first day of school in partnership with Diamond Hill United Methodist Church, First Methodist Church, Little Pub and individual donors, up from 260 students in 2017
- 800 donated toys created smiles for 400 children and their parents at our second annual Holiday Toy Chest
- Thousands of donors provided over 19,000 shopping bags of new and gently used clothing, shoes and outerwear to over 900 local families
- Partnered with the Junior League of Greenwich's New Member class to provide Baby Bundles, including bouncy seats, diapers and new layettes to 40 new parents
- Offered 500 families a truly American Thanksgiving with turkeys and sides provided by Kings Food Markets, St. Michael's Church and Berkshire Hathaway Home Services
- Outfitted dozens of young men and women in formal attire for prom in partnership with the Greenwich High School Former Attire Club

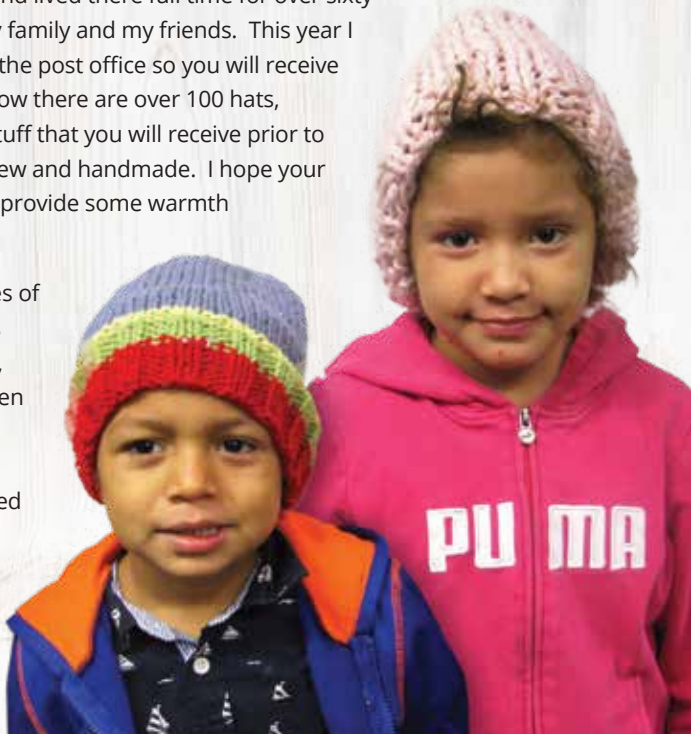
How one woman warmed the hearts *and heads* of our youngest clients

During the fall of 2017, we received a package at Neighbor to Neighbor. It was a box, wrapped in plain brown paper. Inside were a dozen brightly colored hand-knit winter hats and a note from former lifelong Greenwich resident and grandmother Cheryl Feldman:

“The holidays are coming and this year I’m getting an early start. Last year I brought you a big box of mittens, etc., but it was just a few days before Christmas... I

have been knitting for you all year for this Christmas! The time I spent at Neighbor to Neighbor made quite an impact on me and truly when I left your facility it was the beginning of my best holiday ever!!! I donate items in Florida... but it’s not the same as being in a place like yours where I got to see the hard work and dedication of the volunteers firsthand. I even met a client who took home 2 hats for the children who were with her. I come home every Christmas to spend time with my granddaughters, whose giggles, squeals and laughter are the best... Or so I thought until I saw what all of you do for our community. I was so happy I could do something to be part of this effort. It really made it the best Christmas ever and an important reminder of what this holiday is all about. I was raised in Greenwich and lived there full time for over sixty years. I miss my town, my family and my friends. This year I can’t carry that big box to the post office so you will receive several smaller ones. I know there are over 100 hats, some scarves and other stuff that you will receive prior to Christmas. Every item is new and handmade. I hope your clients like them and they provide some warmth on bitter days.”

As promised, several boxes of handknit hats and scarves arrived prior to Christmas, and 100 babies and children received new hats, made with love, to keep them warm. Neighbor is honored to be a conduit for such generosity and warmth throughout the year.



How can so many be working yet still need assistance?

Neighbor to Neighbor's clients are as varied as the population of lower Fairfield County. Half are children and 20% are seniors living on fixed incomes. Eleven percent suffer a debilitating disability. Almost half have someone living in their household who works full time at least part of the year. Mariana and Robert are typical of the over 1,100 families who rely on us to help make ends meet. Mariana works in retail and Robert works in the restaurant industry. His mother lives with them and helps take care of the children. Their schedules are unpredictable and despite two incomes, the money doesn't go far enough.

It can be difficult to understand how so many who work – often more than one job – must rely on a food pantry to make ends meet. **The Connecticut United Ways estimate 21% of Greenwich residents are unable to afford basic necessities, including many who are working.** A recent study by Connecticut Voices for Children sheds some light on what some call a worsening “wage mismatch.” After a long post-recession period, middle- and high-wage jobs are finally being added to Connecticut's stock of available jobs. Moreover, corporate profits surged in Connecticut in the past year, especially among publicly traded companies in southwestern Connecticut. Normally these factors would result in increasing wages for workers, but that is not the case. Connecticut lags behind neighboring states in creating jobs in higher-wage sectors and even within those sectors in which employers say they cannot find skilled workers, wage increases have not occurred. The report suggests this is due in part to “monopsony” power – a few large employers with the power to dominate industry wage expectations. The results, coupled with the high cost of living in lower Fairfield County, are dire for our clients:

A single parent in our area earning the minimum wage would need to work 142 hours per week to be able to afford rent, food, healthcare, childcare and other necessary expenses.

The Economic Policy Institute estimates a family of four in the Stamford area needs to earn over \$118,000 per year to enjoy a “modest yet adequate” standard of living.

Yet, nearly one third of Connecticut workers earn less than \$15/hour

Neighbor to Neighbor is committed to assisting our clients in navigating these economic factors in order to provide adequately for their families, keep healthy food on the table, and maintain their dignity.



Leaving a Legacy

In 2018, Neighbor to Neighbor created the Jane Fleming Legacy Society to recognize those donors who create a lasting legacy by naming Neighbor to Neighbor as a beneficiary in their estate. 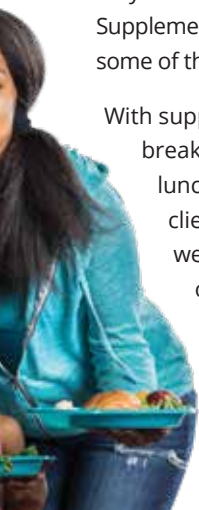

Bridging the summer meals gap with healthy breakfasts

Almost 1 in 6 Greenwich public school students receives free or reduced priced school based meals – twice the number eligible in 2010. That's why Neighbor created the Summer Supplement program to offer additional lunch foods to students when they are home from school during the summer months. Not only does the Summer Supplement program help reduce the "summer slide" of learning, but also alleviates some of the financial strain on parents of providing extra food for growing bodies.

With support from an anonymous grantor, Neighbor to Neighbor has added breakfast to the menu of the Summer Supplement. Now, in addition to daily lunch foods such as tuna, peanut butter, fruits and vegetables, school aged clients receive eggs, cereal, bread, milk and other breakfast foods 7 days a week. Many individual healthy meals have the cumulative positive effect of improving children's health and increasing their chances for success both academically and socially.

During the summer of 2018, **316** students received enough food to prepare **23,212** breakfasts and lunches.



How do we feed and clothe thousands of local residents year round? With hundreds of food and clothing drives!

One donation of a bag of groceries may not seem like it can change the world, but combine it with hundreds of others over the course of a year and suddenly a food pantry is stocked. While we purchase items such as milk, sandwich bread and low fat meats, half of the food we distribute is donated through hundreds of annual food drives each year. Some of our most loyal drives include:

-  **STAMP OUT HUNGER:** The annual Letter Carriers food drive stocks our shelves throughout the summer months
-  **SCOUTING FOR FOOD:** Each year the Boy Scouts of America, Greenwich Council, teams up with local fire houses to collect and sort food and stock our pantry shelves
-  **GREENWICH HIGH SCHOOL ROOTS & SHOOTS CLUB AND HEROES CLUB** “One for One” drive in honor of the victims of the September 11, 2001 terrorist attacks: Each year these dedicated students set a goal of collecting 3,000 food items to turn a tragedy into an opportunity to do good
-  **SEASONAL PRODUCE:** We are proud to partner with many gardeners and farmers to provide a wide array of fresh produce in our pantry. Some of our “partners in produce” include Greenwich Community Gardens, Greenwich Botanical Center (formerly the Garden Education Center), Greenwich Land Trust, Old Greenwich Farmer’s Market, Smith’s Acres, Jones Farm and Back 40 Farm. This year Harvest Time Church joined our list of partners in produce.



One Inspirational Lunch

Neighbor's Spring Luncheon
with *Baked By Melissa* Founder

Baker Melissa Ben-Ishay founded Baked by Melissa after being let go unexpectedly from her marketing job. In the gloom that followed she turned to her passion — baking. With the support of her family, within a year Melissa launched her NYC-based cupcake empire famous for its signature bite-sized treats.



Close to 200 guests joined us at Burning Tree Country Club for Lunch with Melissa and were entertained by this inspiring entrepreneur as she shared her insight on failure, family, and perseverance. Also sharing her story was Vanessa Kuduk, Assistant Vice President of Lending and Hispanic Outreach at Members Credit Union. Vanessa's family came to America when she and her siblings were young children. She recalls coming to Neighbor's Clothing Room for assistance during those early years, and how the help her family received made a difference in their lives. Both women's stories point out that success is dependent upon a belief in oneself and the support of a community – the type of support Neighbor provides for thousands of local residents struggling to make ends meet. The luncheon, organized by event co-chairs Pam Speer, Kristen Shapiro and Christine Zadik, was a sweet success and raised more than \$40,000 for our food pantry and clothing room!

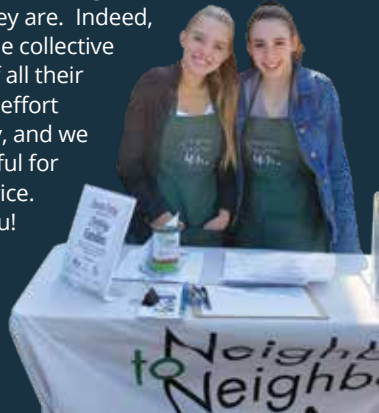

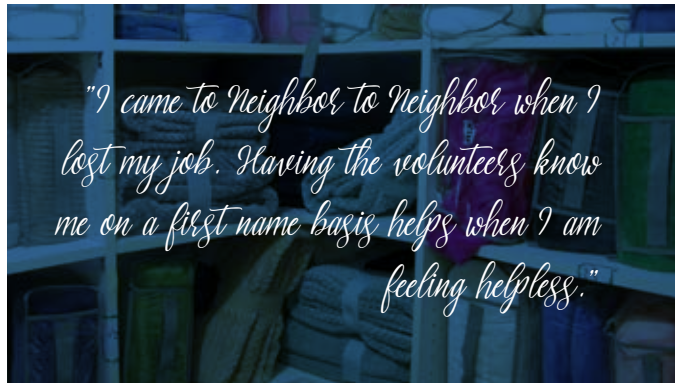

In March 2018, the Superior Court of CT affirmed the October 18, 2016 decision of the Greenwich Planning & Zoning Commission, which granted Neighbor to Neighbor approval to construct a freestanding facility for its operations just steps away from its current location on the campus of Christ Church Greenwich.
